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DEDICATION IN HONOUR OF WALLY DALLEY



It was in Springdale in 1968, during the old days of outdoor rinks, when Wally first got involved in Minor Hockey. He was a member of the organizing committee for Springdale's 1st Minor Hockey System and along with two others, he was instrumental in successfully lobbying to get a stadium for Springdale.

Wally's organizing attributes were also evident in 1977 when he spearheaded the formation of the Central Beothuk Intermediate Hockey League. The league, which lasted until 1994, was an enormous success and evolved to help rejuvenate the quest for the coveted Herder Memorial Trophy. During this time, Wally won a Provincial Championship as a player and successfully coached the Twillingate Combines to three consecutive Provincial Championships.

Wally brought his enthusiasm and experience to the Provincial Minor scene where he dedicated four years as Chairman of Minor Council following eight years as Central Area Director. His hockey endeavors were recognized in 1979 when he was awarded the Outstanding Service Award from the NLHA's Minor Council. Recognition was again conferred in 1984 when Wally received the Outstanding Service Award from the NLHA's Intermediate Council.

With 25 years as a player, 17 years of Minor and Intermediate coaching experience, a level IV Coaching Certificate, a level IV Referees Certificate, four years as a Coaching instructor, and many years in Executive positions, Wally has truly been an outstanding volunteer who contributed to all aspects of the Game.

Wally can be bestowed the recognition of being an organizer, a builder, a coach, a player a referee and most importantly a great Minor Hockey parent. Wally's commitment and dedication at the minor and intermediate levels has helped to foster the growth and development of hockey in Newfoundland and Labrador.

APPLICATION PROCEDURE

The STOP patch is 3" in diameter and is a red octagon with white trim with the word STOP in the centre.

The STOP patch is a nylon material and is easy to sew on. The STOP Patch can also be screen printed.

The placement of the STOP patch on the jersey is to be placed directly above the numbers, below the name/sponsor tag on the backs of jerseys. **DO NOT PLACE AT THE NECK LINE – IT IS NOT SEEN!**

Please ensure that application and positioning of the patches on your jerseys is adhered to for maximum effect.

STOP Patches are available at the Hockey NL Office at a cost of .65 cents each.

I encourage everyone involved to make sure that above all girls have fun while playing the game.

AUTOMATIC MINIMUM SUSPENSIONS

FOR INFRACTIONS WHICH OCCUR IN MINOR & FEMALE HOCKEY

#1. MATCH PENALTIES

Molesting Officials	Indefinite Suspension

Hair Pulling (when match penalty is assessed)	5 games
Grabbing the face mask (when match penalty is assessed)	5 games

Butt Ending (when match penalty is assessed)	4 games

Checking From Behind (when match penalty is assessed)	4 games

#2 CHECKING FROM BEHIND WHERE A MAJOR PENALTY PLUS GAME MISCONDUCT PENALTY IS ASSESSED 3 games

Note: Any player receiving a 5 minute Major Checking From Behind infraction in the last ten minutes of regular time, or any time in overtime, or at the conclusion of the game and prior to the player entering the dressing room, shall be suspended for 1 game in addition to the guideline listed above.

i.e. A player receives a 5-minute major for checking from behind for the first time in a season with 2:00 minutes remaining in the game shall be suspended for the next 4 regular scheduled games.

#3. CHECKING TO THE HEAD WHERE A MAJOR PENALTY PLUS A GAME MISCONDUCT PENALTY IS ASSESSED 3 games

#4. CHECKING TO THE HEAD WHERE A MATCH PENALTY IS ASSESSED 5 games

#5. GROSS MISCONDUCT 3 games

#6. GAME MISCONDUCT

Verbal Abuse of Officials (RULE 9.2) 3 games

Any player or team official who is assessed a Game Misconduct Penalty in the last ten minutes of regular time, or any time in overtime, or at the conclusion of the game and prior to the player or team official entering his dressing room, shall automatically be suspended for one game.

#7. FIGHTING (PLAYING RULE 6.7):

1ST Time – 2 Games in Not Less Than 7 Days

2nd Time – 4 Games in Not Less Than 14 Days

3rd Time – Indefinite

Note: Any player receiving a fighting infraction in the last ten minutes of regular time, or any time in overtime, or at the conclusion of the game and prior to the player or team official entering the dressing room, shall be suspended for 1 game in addition to the guideline listed above.

i.e. A player receives their second fighting infraction of the season with 2:00 minutes remaining in the game shall be suspended for the next 5 regular scheduled games in not less than 14 days

Third Man in a Fight 3 games

Any player receiving a fighting major penalty, which is as a result of a second or subsequent fight during the same stoppage of play game 3 games

INSTIGATOR OR AGGRESSOR OF A FIGHT

1st Offence 2 games

2nd Offence 3 games

3rd Offence 5 games

The coach of the team whose player is penalized for a third offence or instigator or aggressor 4 games

#8. LEAVING THE PLAYERS BENCH 9.5

Player identified as first to leave the player's bench during a fight or for the purpose of starting a fight 4 games

Player identified as first to leave the penalty box during a fight for the purpose of starting a fight 4 games

Coach of a team whose player is penalized under the above two points 4 games

Coach whose player is not identified as the first to leave the player's or penalty bench during an on-ice altercation 3 games

#9 REMOVING THE HELMET INFRACTIONS

Any player who removes their chin straps before or during fights 3 games

If a player removes his helmet and releases his chinstrap to fight and the opposing player doesn't, the former gets an additional two minutes minor penalty 3 games

If the player removes his opponent's helmet or releases the chinstrap before or during a fight 3 games

#10. PRE/POST GAME ALTERCATIONS

Any player involved where major and game misconducts are assessed 4 games

Coach of a team whose players are so penalized Indefinite Suspension

Any team involved in a pre or post game brawl Indefinite Suspension

#11. REFUSING TO START PLAY

To be referred to the President of Hockey NL for Ruling

NOTE #1: Applicable in league games and tournament games

NOTE#2: Suspensions for all infractions will begin to be served immediately after the assessment of the penalty in accordance with the suspension guidelines above.

NOTE#3: When the suspension carries a time frame (i.e. 7 days), the player will serve the full 7 days. For example, if an infraction occurs during a game on Saturday, the player cannot return until the following Sunday. In no case can the day on which the infraction occurred be counted as a day of suspension.

NOTE#4: Players who are under suspension can practice only with their league teams.

NOTE#5: In all cases where the infractions result in bodily injury, the suspensions will be of a longer duration.

NOTE#6: Players receiving gross misconducts or match penalties are not eligible to play until the suspension has been ruled on.

NOTE#7: A high school player who is also a registered minor or junior hockey player, who receives a suspension for a gross misconduct or match penalty from Hockey NL, must serve his/her suspension by applying games and/or time allotment in the division of which the infraction occurred, however, the player is suspended from all Hockey NL sanctioned games until the suspension is served.

NOTE#8: A high school player who is also a registered minor or junior hockey player, who receives a suspension for all other infractions, must serve his/her suspension by applying games and/or time allotment in the division of which the infraction occurred however, the player is not suspended from all other Hockey NL sanctioned games.

NOTE#9: Any coach or team official who provides wine, beer or any other alcoholic beverages, or knowingly allows these beverages to be consumed by legally under aged members of their team, while they are responsible for these players shall receive a suspension of not less than two (2) years.

NOTE#10: Team/league/association presidents have the authority to give out a more severe suspension. All suspensions must be reported to the Provincial Office by the president.

NOTE#11: The above procedures would also allow for a player to first make an appeal to his/her league and further appeal to the Hockey NL Appeals Committee, if necessary. All appeals to the Hockey NL Appeals Committee must be made by the player in writing within 14 days of the suspension and this appeal must be accompanied with a \$200.00 appeal fee made payable to Hockey NL. \$100.00 will be refundable if you are successful with your appeal.

NOTE#12: Any member of a coaching staff not wearing a CSA certified hockey helmet with chin strap during on ice functions except games will receive a one (1) game suspension.

SUPPLEMENTARY TO HOCKEY CANADA PLAYING RULE 3.6

#1: The wearing of a **STOP Patch** properly attached above the numbers is compulsory for players registered in minor and female hockey. When a player fails to wear or properly wear a STOP Patch, his team will receive one warning. The player will have to leave the ice and return when the STOP Patch is properly attached. Any player on that team who commits a subsequent infraction will receive a Misconduct Penalty. Referees are encouraged to deliver this warning directly to the coach.

#2: The wearing of a **Mouth Guard** is compulsory for players registered in minor and female hockey. When a player fails to wear or properly wear a Mouth Guard, his team will receive one warning. Any player on that team who commits a subsequent infraction will receive a Misconduct Penalty. Players are excluded who have doctor's notes. Referees are encouraged to deliver this warning directly to the coach.

SANCTIONING GUIDELINES

ON-ICE ACTIVITIES

1. Any activity which is a part of a Hockey NL member association/league/team's program will be sanctioned. This may include fall/spring conditioning and evaluation camps. Any association/league/team having invitational or exhibition tournaments and jamborees must first receive the sanction of the Hockey NL and will be required to complete a Tournament Sanction Request Form. The tournament sanctioning must be requested through the Hockey NL office three weeks prior to the commencement of the tournament. Hockey NL does not sanction Summer Hockey with the exception of the Hockey NL Program of Excellence and "AAA" Midget Training Camps. Summer hockey is considered to be played between May 1 and August 1.
2. TOURNAMENT POLICIES: "Within the jurisdiction of Hockey NL, tournament sanctioning, coordination and operation cannot be subcontracted, transferred or conveyed in any form or manner to a non-member or private enterprise entity."
3. Hockey NL member teams must be competing against other Hockey NL or HC member teams in order to have coverage. Coverage will not be extended to Hockey NL member teams who participate against non Hockey NL/HC member teams. Hockey NL member teams competing against IIHF or USA hockey member teams in events sanctioned by the appropriate body will be covered. (See HC Regulation D, Exhibition Games and Tours).
4. One exception would be for "benefit games". "Benefit Games" in which an Hockey NL member team is playing a game against a non Hockey NL/HC member team in a fund-raising situation, the Hockey NL member team would be covered, however, coverage would not be extended to the non member team. An example of this would be the minor hockey dads playing against a local team in a fund-raising or charity game. Hockey NL may have the ability to sanction this form of activity at their discretion.
5. In cases where the Hockey NL has granted "overage" status to a minor hockey player, the player and those he or she competes against will be covered.
6. Hockey NL may sanction fall or spring hockey schools if they are conducted by a member association and if all proceeds go back to the local minor hockey association.
7. Hockey NL may sanction Skate-a-thons if involving registered members.
8. Hockey NL will sanction dry land training if all participants are registered members and the training has the sanctioning of the association/league/team.

9. Hockey NL will sanction year end banquets for registered associations/ leagues/ teams only.

10. Hockey NL may sanction the following fund-raising activities provided the association/league/team has the appropriate certification from the Provincial Government's Lotteries Licensing Board:

1. Chocolate bar sales
2. Bottle drives
3. Bingo
4. Car wash
5. Ticket sales
6. Chuck a puck

Any association/league/team holding special events or fundraising activities will be required to complete a Special Event Request Form for possible sanctioning. The special event sanctioning must be requested through the Hockey NL office three weeks prior to the commencement of the event. Hockey NL will review each request separately and any events that are deemed to be high-risk will not be sanctioned.

11. The following fund-raising activities or functions will not be sanctioned by Hockey NL:

1. Community festivals
2. Rock concerts
3. Dunk tanks
4. Musical festivals
5. Selling of alcohol
6. Slo-pitch tournament and other sports related activities.

Any activity or event requested that is not covered in these guidelines will be handled independently by Hockey NL.

DUTIES OF HOCKEY NL CO-ORDINATORS FOR EASTER PROVINCIAL TOURNAMENTS

- 1.....To hold a meeting with team officials before the opening game and go over the tournament rules and regulations.
- 2.....To handle any disputes.
- 3.....To report any suspensions to Hockey NL.
- 4.....To make sure the local co-ordinator phones the scores daily to Lynette Hiscock, Secretary Phone 709-466-3810 709-427-7530 Fax 709-466-6453 E-mail: ljhiscock15@hotmail.com
- 5.....To present championship trophy and medals and to acknowledge the title sponsor Steele Hotels in closing ceremonies.
- 6.....To check team roster sheets against score sheets prior to the first game and to spot check their lineups. If a name does not appear on the team roster sheet, contact the Hockey NL office in Grand Falls-Windsor (709-489-5512) or call after 5:00 pm (709-486-0442) to confirm the registration or non-registration of the player. The player is not permitted to participate in tournament play until his/her eligibility has been confirmed.
- 7.....To complete, in every detail, the tournament co-ordinator's report and return with all score sheets to the Hockey NL office.
- 8.....A coin toss at the coaches meeting will decide home and visiting teams in round robin play. In the semi finals and final playoff games, the team that finishes the highest shall be the home team. (Amended June 1994).
- 9.....During tournaments for Provincial Championships, any team found guilty by Hockey NL of deliberately losing to tying a game by their actions on the ice shall be eliminated from the tournament. Points awarded for any game involving such teams would be declared null and void and not included in the final team standings for playoff positions. Suspensions of the team officials would be at the discretion of the Minor Council Executive after receiving the Hockey NL tournament co-ordinators report.
- 10....To ensure the following ice time allocations are monitored and enforced:

DEFINITIONS

Equal: Is defined as equal ice time every game. There has to be a variable allowed due to the uncertainty in the frequency in stoppages of play. Goaltenders have the option of changing during the mid-way point of each game or play full games as long as they have equal game time throughout a season and/or provincial championship. Goaltenders are restricted to a one game differential throughout the season or tournament. The championship game in a provincial tournament is excluded from this definition for goaltenders only. Coaches may play either goaltender.

Discretion 1: Is defined as equal ice time every game, however, there is the ability for a coach to use select players in the last three minutes of a period and on all special team situations.

Discretion 2: Is defined as the ability for a coach to use players anytime during the game as they decide; however, each player must receive a minimum of 3 shifts per period.

Special Team Situation: Any situation that does not require 5 skaters vs. 5 skaters.

Select: Any team that is formed based on a selection process or any team participating in a provincial championship.

Non Select: Any team formed that is not based on a selection process. Teams are formed based on other factors (age, random assignment, house league).

Regional: Any team formed based on a selection process involving a number of Associations (Major Midget, AAA program).

GRIEVANCE PROCEDURE

GAME TYPE:

Regular Season/League, Exhibition &/or Invitational Tournaments:

The complainant must register their complaint with their local Minor Hockey Association and/or League who is responsible for such complaints and they will determine if the guideline is being followed.

Provincial Championships:

For Hockey NL Provincial Tournaments the complainant must register the complaint with the Hockey NL coordinator who will determine if the guideline is being followed.

SANCTIONS

Any coach who is found not following the Provincial Ice Time Allocation Guideline will be provided with a first time warning. If a second registered complaint is investigated during a season or tournament and it is found that the coach has continued not to adhere to the Ice Time Allocation Guideline, the Head Coach will be immediately suspended for one year. No warning is required to apply the sanction during a team's last game of the provincial championship.

NOTE

There is some flexibility in this guideline. There are situations where players/goaltenders are not playing due to physical restrictions. Goaltenders can be changed in a game when their team is trailing by five or more goals.

All Hockey NL co-ordinators should send copies of all HC injury reports completed by team trainers to the Hockey NL provincial office with game sheets and report forms.

REMINDERS:

- Have copy of tournament rules and rule book
- Trophies and Medals are available
- Score sheet copies available for coaches
- In your absence, appoint local co-ordinators to be in charge
- Hockey NL co-ordinators not to assume responsibilities such as refereeing, coaching, etc.

2012-2013 MINOR HOCKEY PROVINCIAL TOURNAMENT PROCEDURES

1. Entries in Provincial Championships in each division will be limited to six centres with the schedule being a single round robin. In a five or six team tournament the teams finishing in first and second place at the conclusion of the round robin shall play each other for the championship.

For a four team tournament a single round robin shall be played to determine the standings. The first place team will have a bye. The second and third place teams play each other in a semi-final game. The winner of the semi-final game plays the first place teams for the gold and silver medals. The loser of the semi-final game plays the fourth place team for the bronze.

In a three team tournament a double round robin will be played with the first place team getting a bye into the championship game. The second and third place teams will play a semi-final game with the winner advancing to the championship game. The loser will be awarded the bronze medal.

The awarding of medals at Provincial Tournaments is compulsory. These medals will be supplied by the Hockey NL Minor Council and will be awarded in the following manner:

- A. The Gold medal will be awarded to the winner of the championship game of the tournament.
- B. The Silver medal will be awarded to the runner up which is the loser of the championship game.
- C. The Bronze medal must be awarded to the third place finisher or the winner of the bronze medal game of a four team tournament.

2. For all Provincial Tournament Games, in all divisions, periods will be three stop time fifteen minute periods.

3. No overtime will be played in round robin tournament games. In the event of a tie each team will be awarded one point. In the championship game overtime shall be played if necessary, according to paragraph 10(G).

4. Hockey Canada Tie-Breaking System

Tie Breaking Sequence

Two Teams Tied

If two or more teams are tied at the conclusion of a round robin series, then the following procedure will be used to determine the final ranking before the semi-final and final games are played.

In the event that teams are tied for a playoff position, the following procedure will apply:

If two teams are tied

- 1.1 The winner of the round robin game between the two tied teams gains the higher position
- 1.2 The team with the most wins in the round robin gains the higher position.
- 1.3 If the two teams are still tied after 1.1 and 1.2 have been applied then the team with the best goal average gains the higher position. The goal average of a team is to be determined in the following manner.

Total number of goals for divided by the total number of goals for and against.

Note: All round robin games are included

Example: 10 Goals For 4 Goals Against

$$\begin{array}{r} \text{Percentage} \quad 10 \\ \hline \quad \quad \quad 10+4 \end{array} = .714$$

Note: The higher percentage gains the higher position.

- 1.4 If the two teams are still tied after 1.1, 1.2 and 1.3 have been applied, the team with the least number of minutes in penalties throughout all of the round robin games gains the higher position.
- 1.5 If the two teams are still tied after 1.1, 1.2, 1.3 and 1.4 have been applied, then the team which scored the first goal in the game between the tied teams gains the higher position.
- 1.6 If the two teams are still tied after 1.2, 1.2, 1.3, 1.4 and 1.5 have been applied, a single coin toss will determine which team gains the higher position.

Three or More Teams Tied

Note: The three-team tiebreaker is used to determine the seedling of the 1st, 2nd, 3rd seed. If any step in the tiebreaker only seeds one team, that team assumes that position. The three-team tiebreaker will continue to determine the seeding of the two remaining teams. At no time will teams using this formula go back to the two-team tiebreaker.

2. If three or more teams are tied, the point record established in the game among the tied teams only will be used as the first tie breaking formula in deciding which team(s) shall advance.

2.1 The team with the most wins would gain the highest position.

2.2 If the teams are still tied after 2.1 has been applied, then the team with the best goal average gains the highest position. The goal average of a team is to be determined in the following manner: total number of goals for divided by total number of goals for and against.

Note: All round robin games are included

Example: 10 Goals for 4 Goals Against

$$\frac{\text{Percentage 10}}{10 + 4} = .714$$

Note: The highest percentage gains the highest position(s).

The exercise of 2.2 establishes the team or teams with highest position(s) by percentage. These teams will advance. If there are still teams tied, they go to the next step. They do not go back to the "Two Team Tie Breaker".

Example:

A. Team A - .714 = 1 seed – Advances

Team B - .500 = 3 seed – Does not Advance

Team C - .650 = 2 seed – Advances

B. Team A - .714 = 1 seed – Advances

Team B - .500 = Still tied with team C – go to next step 2.3

Team C - .500 = Still tied with team B – go to next step 2.3

C. Team A - .650 = Still tied with team B – go to next step 2.3

Team B - .650 = Still tied with team A – go to next step 2.3

Team C - .500 = Does not advance

2.3 If teams are still tied after 2.1 and 2.2 the team(s) with the fewest goals against (all round robin games played) will gain the highest position.

2.4 If teams are still tied after 2.1, 2.2, and 2.3 the team(s) with the most goals for (all round robin games played) will gain the highest position(s).

2.5 If teams are still tied after 2.1, 2.2, 2.3 and 2.4 have been applied, the team to qualify would be the team(s) that received the least number of minutes in penalties throughout all the round robin games.

2.6 If teams are still tied after 2.1, 2.2, 2.3, 2.4 and 2.5 have been applied, a coin toss shall determine the winner. In a 3 team coin toss, the odd team gains the highest position.

5. BNQ approved throat protectors, CSA approved face masks and helmets must be worn by all participants, in all games, in all divisions. In addition Intra Oral Mount Guards with strap unless form fitted.
6. Hockey NL referees and linesman for provincial tournaments will be provided by the host committee and approved by the Hockey NL referee-in-chief. Payment to officials will not exceed the scale recommended by Hockey NL.
7. Score keepers, time keepers, penalty keepers, goal judges and other necessary minor officials must be provided by the tournament host committee and meet with the approval of the Hockey NL representative. Score sheets are to be returned to the Hockey NL office: P.O. Box 176, Grand Falls-Windsor, NL A2A 2J4 immediately after the tournament.
8. In associations where sufficient players are registered in a division, teams must carry 17 players, at least two of whom must be goaltenders. Teams with only one goaltender are permitted to register and carry 16 players. Exceptions may be permitted to carry less than the required number in extenuating circumstances as determined and approved by the Minor Council Area Director and/or Chairperson. The minimum number of players for a team is 12 players one of whom must be a goaltender and a maximum number of players for a team is 19 players at least two of whom must be a goaltender. (Passed September 2004)

In the event of an injury or illness or suspension by the association or Hockey NL to a goal keeper during a tournament, coaches have the option of: dressing another player, accepting a goaltender from the host association (if available), or forfeiting the game. (passed September 1992).

9. A) Minor Hockey Associations are only permitted to use a maximum of 4 Novice players to make up a total of 15 players, one of whom must be a goalie. Novice players that are picked up must come from your own association. No Atom players will be displaced in this process.
B) The Novice players must be in their final year of Novice eligibility and graduating to Atom in the next hockey season.
10. A) In all divisions of hockey, the goal posts must be anchored in such a way that they break loose on sudden impact.
B) It is the responsibility of the host centre to provide an extra set of jersey's for a possible change.
C) Any combination of three major penalties during the tournament will result in the said player being eliminated from the remainder of the tournament.

- D) A player can only play one provincial tournament in any playing year.
- E) The referee or linesman will stop the play immediately if a player of either team receives an injury, no matter what team has possession of the puck.
- F) Coaches must have their certified roster available at all tournaments.
- G) Championship games: in the event of a tie between two teams, the teams will take a two minute break and play for a sudden victory. The first overtime will be ten minutes and the sudden victory (the 1st goal scored) will decide the winner. In the event teams are still tied at the end of the first overtime, a ten minute break will be allowed and both teams will resume a ten minute period with the sudden victory rule in effect. This will continue until a winner is declared.

11. BODY CHECKING:

Is permitted in all divisions & categories of Pee Wee and above.

BOARDING AND BODY CHECKING:

Is prohibited in division of atom and below and female hockey. A minor penalty or, at the discretion of the referee, a major penalty and a game misconduct penalty shall be assessed any player who, in the opinion of the referee, intentionally body checks, bumps, shoves or pushes any opposing player.

12. BILLETING:

Billets must be in the area in which the tournament is being played. Visiting teams must request the number of billets required no later than 21 days prior to the tournament. A player whose parents indicate in writing that their child will not require a billet, will be permitted to stay in the accommodations arranged by the parents who will be responsible for that player. (Passed June 1996)

13. Associations hosting an Easter Tournaments are responsible for booking hotel accommodations for coaching staff of all visiting teams. (passed September 1996)

14. BANQUETS held during Easter Tournaments will be at the discretion of the host center and will not be scheduled for the last day of the tournament. All coaches and teams are encouraged to attend banquets. (Passed September 1992) If a team fails to participate in the banquet event provided by the host association without just cause, then the team will be fined 100.00. Such \$100.00 fine shall be paid to the host association.

15. FAIR PLAY CONCEPT:

The concept of fair play is the responsibility of each Minor Hockey Association and the associations must ensure this concept is being enforced. (Passed September 1994)

16. MERCY RULE:

Where a ten (10) goal differential occurs anytime during the game in all divisions, the game officially declared as per the score at that time. At the discretion of the referee and the Hockey NL coordinator, and in consultation with the coaches, a decision may be made to let the game continue after the ten (10) goal differential, however, no further goals will be recorded, only penalty infractions. (Passed September 2001)

17. PICK UP PLAYERS:

Any association that doesn't have sufficient numbers to make up a team will have the opportunity to pick up players from their next closest neighbouring association. (Passed September 2004)

18. GAME REST PERIOD:

During Provincial Tournaments, each team must have a minimum of two (2) hour rest period before each game. (Passed September 1992)

19. CODE OF ETHICS:

It is considered unethical for a manager, coach, trainer, director of teams, league executive members, or any members that are affiliated with Hockey NL to make direct derogatory or disparaging remarks to the media or public domain about any other person, member or affiliate of Hockey NL. (Passed September 1992)

20. TIME OUTS:

One (1) "Time Out" of 30 seconds will be permitted per game (including overtime). The "No Time Out Rule" still applies in house league competition. (Passed June 1993)

21. SKILLS COMPETITION:

Host centers that don't have a full compliment of teams and wishing to have skills competition may do so with the approval of their Area Director. The skills competition will be optional for teams/players wishing to participate. (Passed September 2004)

22. **REQUIRED CERTIFICATIONS:** (Approved September 2011)

ATOM, PEEWEE, BANTAM AND MIDGET DIVISIONS

All Coaches and Assistant Coaches must be Coach Level or Coach Stream (CBET) certified. For Provincial play, at least one member of the coaching staff must be development I certified.

AAA CATEGORY TEAMS

At least one coach or assistant coach must be Intermediate Level or Development I certified. All other coaches must be Coach Level or Coach Stream Certified.

INTRO TO COACH

All Coaches coaching at the initiation or novice levels

HOCKEY CANADA SAFETY PROGRAM

All teams must have at least one on-bench official certified in the Hockey Canada Safety Program (HCSP)

SPEAK OUT PROGRAM

All on-bench officials must have certification in the Speak Out Program.

23. Provincial Tournaments have priority over High School, League Playoffs, Exhibition and Out-of-Province Tournaments.
24. Any Minor Hockey Associations who does not wish to have their teams compete in provincial tournaments must advise the Grading Committee by January 10. Minor Hockey Associations who have not stated their intention to be excluded for provincial play will be expected to fill this commitment. Failure to do so will result in disciplinary action.
25. Teams failing to participate in opening ceremonies of the Provincial Tournament will result in the Head Coach of said team being suspended for the next two (2) games his/her team participates in following the Opening Ceremonies.
26. **PROTESTS:**
1. Protests of games may be made only in regard to interpretation of the rules of competition and not in regard to the judgement of a referee or other official.
 2. (a) Verbal protest must be registered by the Captain of the aggrieved team to the referee at the first reasonable opportunity after the action or decision complained of, but in all cases must be made within five minutes after the cease of the period or overtime period in which such action or decision is made. The referee shall note such

protest on the game report. Such verbal protests shall be ignored if not followed up as hereinafter described.

(b) Any protest of a game regarding matters outside the game officials' jurisdiction such as scheduling, player eligibility, etc., may be made without the verbal notice or time limit required in (a) above.

3. All protests and all evidence in support thereof must be made in writing in duplicate and must be signed by two authorized representatives of the protesting team, league or association and must be accompanied by the applicable protest fee.

4. (a) At Provincial Minor tournaments any protest must be presented in writing to the Provincial Representative at the tournament at the conclusion of the game for which the protest is being made, and it must be accompanied with a \$50 non-refundable protest fee, payable to the Hockey NL Minor Council. No protest will be entertained on the outcome of any final championship game.

5. When necessary a decision on any protest must be given at least six hours prior to the next game in which the protesting team is to compete.

6. The decision on a protest will be made by the official named above to receive the protest who will solicit advice or information from any source which he feels will be of assistance in rendering a decision.

7. The Chairperson of the division concerned and the President of Hockey NL shall be informed as soon as possible of any protests.

8. Where the protest has been ruled on by a League President or minor tournament representative an appeal may be made to the Chairperson of the division concerned and where the protest has been ruled on by an Area Director or a Hockey NL Chairperson an appeal may be made to the Appeals Committee of Hockey NL. Appeals to the Hockey NL Appeals Committee must be accompanied with a \$200.00 fee made payable to Hockey NL. \$100.00 will be refunded if the appellant is successful.

9. (a) In all divisions of hockey, any such appeal must be made in writing within 48 hours of the original decision being given and must be accompanied by a payment of \$200. A decision on the appeal must be given within a further 48 hours. The decision of the Appeals Committee shall be final.

2011-2012 Hockey Canada Playing Rules Emphasis

Please ensure that this Bulletin is given the widest possible distribution, especially at all development clinics. The 2011-2012 Rules Emphasis has been approved by the Hockey Canada Board of Directors, and mandates that all Hockey Canada participants are to adhere to these guidelines.

The enforcement of this rules standard in our game will continue to allow for improved skill development and positive hockey experiences.

The mission of Hockey Canada is clear; the game will be enhanced through the application of the standard of enforcement and rules emphasis.

RULES EMPHASIS

Rule 6.5 Head Contact

- (a) In Minor and Female, a Minor Penalty shall be assessed to any player who accidentally contacts an opponent in the head, face or neck with his stick or any part of the player's body or equipment.
- (b) In Minor and Female, a Double Minor Penalty or a Major and a Game Misconduct Penalty, at the discretion of the Referee and based on the degree of violence of impact shall be assessed to any player who intentionally contacts an opponent in the head, face or neck with her stick or any part of the player's body or equipment.
- (c) In Junior and Senior, a Minor and a Misconduct penalty, or a Major and a Game Misconduct penalty, at the discretion of the Referee based on the degree of violence of impact, shall be assessed to any player who checks an opponent in the head in any manner.
- (d) A Major and a Game Misconduct penalty, or a Match penalty shall be assessed any player who injures an opponent under this Rule.
- (e) A Match penalty shall be assessed any player who deliberately attempts to injure or deliberately injures an opponent under this Rule.

Note: All contact above the shoulders (neck, face and head) is to be called Head Contact under one of the above (In minor and female).

THIS RULE CHANGE WILL COME INTO EFFECT IMMEDIATELY

Clarifications On Head Contact For Junior & Senior Hockey ONLY

Referees should be aware of the tragic consequences of head injuries and concussions and strictly enforce the rule. It is the responsibility of players, team officials and Referees to make every attempt possible to reduce the incident of this frightful injury. Team officials can teach players legitimate methods of checking an opponent, while players can be educated to the dangers of checks to the head. The Referee has the responsibility to penalize players who contact an opponent in the head. If the Referees are consistent and strict in calling infractions that may lead to concussions, then along with the cooperation of players and team officials, these type of fouls and the chances of a player suffering such injuries can be significantly reduced. The Head Contact penalty is based on the "degree of violence of impact" and can be defined in three categories: minimal, moderate and severe.

Minimal impact would be called under other appropriate rules. e.g. elbowing, highsticking, roughing, roughing after the whistle, etc. A glancing blow or minimal impact to the head where a penalty is warranted. Moderate impact would be a more significant degree of violence without injury that warrants a Minor and Misconduct penalty under the Head Contact rule. Severe impact would be a high degree of violence, with or without injury, that warrants a Major and Game Misconduct or a Match penalty, at the discretion of the Referee under the Head Contact rule. What previously may have been considered a legal check with a shoulder check to the head shall now be penalized as Head Contact if moderate or severe impact is made. These Head Contact infractions can occur anywhere on the playing surface as a result of the initial contact to the Head. Head Contact could also be the result of an open ice hit, with or without the fouled player's head being down. Body checking has not been removed from the game, but high hits or targeting the head shall be penalized. A fight is still to be called a fight, not Head Contact. Referees are to strictly enforce penalties that call for infractions as a result of low hits as these types of infractions may increase. The penalty signal for "Head Contact" will be patting flat (open palm) of the non-whistle hand on the side of the head.

Additional Rules

1. Any association not represented at the annual or fall meetings of Hockey NL without just cause will be charged a penalty of \$5.00 for each registered player for the first time absent and double this amount for the second time absent. If an association does not pay their fine then they will not be permitted to play in the Provincial Tournament.
2. Any team dropping out within 30 days prior to the Provincial Tournament shall pay a fine of \$1,000.00 to the Host Association and \$1,000.00 to Hockey NL Minor Council.
3. Practice to Game Ratio (1:2) One practice to every two games with the exception of the Midget division. (Adopted September 2001)
4. No atom age player may participate with a Pee Wee division team unless they register and stay in Pee Wee.
5. No Bantam Age player is eligible to register or participate with a Midget team unless numbers warrant and permission is granted from the Minor Council Executive. (Approved June 2002)
6. All Minor Hockey Associations with teams traveling outside of their Association within the Province of Newfoundland and Labrador must complete and file a Minor Hockey Travel Notice Form with their respective Area Director. Failure to comply with this requirement shall result in a \$250.00 sanction to the Minor Hockey Association.

This excludes travel within a sanctioned league. All leagues shall file their schedule with their respective Area Director and with the Hockey NL Branch Office.

Minor Hockey Associations who host games and/or tournaments with teams from outside of their Association will be required to request a Travel Notice Form for each team. Failure to comply with this shall result in a \$250.00 fine to the Host Association.

7. A Minor Hockey Association refusing to host a Provincial Tournament will be fined \$1,000.00 and further, refusing to host said tournament may result in your association not being permitted to participate in the provincial tournaments.

(Adopted September 2003)

8. It is mandatory for all coaches and on ice staff to wear a CSA certified hockey helmet with chin strap while attending practices. The following sanctions have been adopted for those members that do not adhere to the mandatory helmet policy:

First Offence: Warning

Second Offence: Thirty day suspension to the coach and a \$500 fine to the home association.

Third Offence: Indefinite suspension to the coach and association to be reviewed by the Executive Committee of Hockey NL

9. Minor Council Executive Committee members are not to be involved in decision making roles with any minor and major midget hockey association or executives including Triple "A" and Major Midget.

Code of Ethics

Managers and coaches are expected to share with game officials the responsibility for orderly conduct of the contest by the following:

- i. By acknowledging the authority of officials in a contest and by relating to them in a respectful manner.
- ii. By exercising control over players in their charge and serving as a stabilizing agent during contentious moments of games.
- iii. By exercising control of their own conduct so as to avoid inciting players, officials and spectators.
- iv. By conducting themselves at all times in a manner which is appropriate to the responsibilities of their position.

The Hockey NL Initiation Program/Novice Hockey Model Program

(Amended September 2008)

This Program is based on a child who starts hockey at 5 years old and spends 4 years in hockey before entering Atom:

(Year 1) – 5 year old – Initiation Program 1 = IP Books "A" and "B"

(Year 2) – 6 year old – Initiation Program 2 – IP Books "C" and "D"

(Year 3) – 7 year old – Novice Hockey = Introduction to Hockey

Coaching - teaching first half of year

- positioning for face-offs

- goaltending

- offsides

- general rules of the game

- practice/game ratio 2/1

Introduction to game and jamborees (players/parents)
(Year 4) – 8 year old Novice Hockey

Practice/game ratio 2/1

NOTE: Tournaments are considered 3 games regardless of the number of games played.

All Hockey NL Initiation Program Instructors must wear a CSA certified helmet while on the ice during practices and warm ups. Teams in Novice and Initiation that travel outside their area must have a travel permit signed by their Area Director.

Hockey NL strictly prohibits Novice Select Teams, Tournaments and or leagues. The only exception is a one time year-end tournament for 8 year-old Novice players to help prepare in their advancement to Atom Hockey.

MINOR HOCKEY AAA PROCEDURES AND GUIDELINES

(AS AMENDED SEPTEMBER 2010)

PREAMBLE: Hockey NL offers a AAA program for divisions that require teams to compete and represent the branch in regional championships. The AAA program is meant to supplement the local minor hockey association. Players/coaches first priority shall be to their local association. The AAA program is not an entity of its own rather it was developed for the enhancement of players who require a higher category of competition.

1. Division, Zones and Host Associations

Divisions: Pee Wee, Bantam and Midget

Zones: Tri-Com, St. John's, Tri Pen, Central, Western and Northern. The definition of boundaries for each zone is developed annually based on the number of teams entered in a season.

Host Association: Identified annually by the respective Area Director.

2. Coach and Team Selection

- a. The Head Coach and Director of Operations shall be selected by the respective Hockey NL Area Director and approved by the Minor Council Chair. Preference will be provided to personnel who are currently active with a minor hockey association.
- b. The respective Area Director in consultation with the Minor Council Chair shall select the Assistance Coach and Safety Person for each team after the completion of the selection process.
- c. Any male or female player registered in the Pee Wee, Bantam or Midget division with their respective minor hockey association shall be eligible to participate with their respective divisional AAA team. All players and coaching staff shall be in good standing with their respective association to be eligible to participate in the AAA program. Associations are responsible to inform their Area Director if a players or coach is not in good standing.
- d. All teams will be selected by an evaluation process involving two independent evaluators and the respective Head Coach. The Minor

Council Chair in consultation with local area director shall appoint the independent evaluators for each zone and team, and the evaluators shall not have a child(ren) participating in the AAA program. The cost associated for the independent evaluators shall be included in the selection process registration fees.

- e. The Director of Operations, or designate, shall conduct an orientation session during the first selection camp.
- f. The selection process shall include a minimum of six hours to a maximum of twelve hours of ice time.
- g. A maximum of \$10 per hour per participant shall be charged for all selection camps.
- h. The practice to game ration during selection camps shall be 1:1.
- i. All selection camps shall start no later than November 1st. Teams shall be selected and team rosters submitted to the Hockey NL office along with the following information by no later than November 22nd.
 - i. Name of Team
 - ii. Division
 - iii. Name of the person responsible for the team
 - iv. Team Roster of nineteen (15 skaters, two goaltenders iv. and two alternates)
 - v. Team Colors

3. Team Operation

- a. There shall be a maximum of five hours of practice per week with a maximum of three hours on ice.
- b. All exhibition games, tournaments and travel shall require prior approval by the respective Area Director or Minor Council Chair.
- c. Each team shall be allowed one out of province tournament per season and shall require a travel permit approved by the Minor Council Vice-Chair.
- d. All teams shall present to their respective Host Association and Area Director, an annual operation budget by no later than December 7th and a year-end financial statement by no later than April 30th.

4. Provincials

- a. Representation: Each team or league, if applicable, shall declare its participation in provincial championships in each division by no later than December 31st of each season. In the Pee Wee, Bantam and Midget AAA divisions, each integrated league structure shall delegate its championship team and it is understood that each region/league will be allowed to be represented.
- b. Team Withdrawal: Teams or leagues withdrawing shall be assessed a fine in the amount of two thousand dollars {\$2000.00}
- c. Declaring Champions: Actual champions shall be declared fourteen days {14} days before beginning the Provincials. If playoffs are not completed for whatever reason, the Minor Council Executive will designate the most advanced team as representatives of the region/league to Hockey NL Championships.
- d. Respecting Rules and Regulations
 - i. To be eligible to participate in a Provincial i. Championship, a team must have respected all Hockey Canada

and Hockey NL Rules and Regulations.

- ii. Teams failing to send a representative to the meeting held prior to the Provincial AAA Championship may result in the Head Coach being suspended for the first two {2} games his/her team participates in.
- iii. Teams failing to participate in the opening ceremonies of the Provincial AAA Championship, if applicable, shall result in the Head Coach of said team being suspended for the next two {2} games following Opening Ceremonies.

2012-2013 FEMALE RULES AND REGULATIONS

(These rules are referring to girls who register and play female hockey)

FEMALE ENTRY AGE RULES FOR UNDER 12, UNDER 15 AND UNDER 20

Under 12 Division:

9, 10 and 11 years old as of December 31 of the current hockey season.

Under 15 Division:

12, 13 and 14 years old as of December 31 of the current hockey season.

Under 20 Division:

15, 16, 17, 18 and 19 years old as of December 31 of the current hockey season.

Players play in the division their age dictates unless they have been evaluated by either (1) a member of Hockey Development or (2) the Association's Technical Director. If neither 1 nor 2 are available, the highest coach level in their association. Players must be found to be too strong for the division they are moving from. Players must meet all required criteria. Request to move must be received within 30 days after the start-up of the applicable association.

Where associations do not have sufficient numbers to register a team, a "Request to Pick Up A Player" form must be forwarded to the Female Zone Coordinator. This form must be signed by the President of the two associations involved. The Zone Coordinators response will be forwarded to both the Female Chair and the Hockey NL Office. Verbal request will not be entertained. Requests to pick up female players must be submitted on the Female pick up forms.

Female Teams must use the Travel forms found under Forms in the Female section on the Hockey NL web site.

Guidelines for under age Pick- ups:

1. Pickups must come from the home association first.
2. In all cases, the oldest players will be picked up first. ie: Under 15 will pick up a first year pee wee and Under 20 will pick up a second year bantam.
3. If there are not sufficient numbers in the home association, the association will have the opportunity to pick up players from their closest neighboring association.
4. Player can only be picked up from one division lower. (Under 20 will not be permitted to pick up a player from Under 12).
5. Exemptions for these guidelines may be made for goalies.
6. Teams may pick up players to a maximum of 19, at the discretion of the Female Executive Committee. Two MUST be goalies.
7. Eight year olds are not eligible to play in Provincials.

THESE GUIDELINES ARE IN ADDITION TO THE MINOR HOCKEY PROVINCIAL TOURNAMENT PROCEDURES AS OUTLINED IN THE MINOR DIRECTORY.

Provincial Tournament Rules:

1. Girls who do not register and play on female teams will only be permitted to play in the Female Provincials after all female players are accommodated on teams. Then only to a roster of 15.
2. Where associations agree to open boundaries to form a league, players from

- those associations must be registered and playing in the league to be eligible to participate in the female Regional or Provincial Tournaments.
3. In Female hockey, where boundaries have been opened, to allow pooled teams, players will register with the host association of the respective division.
 4. Players in pooled leagues will either return to their home associations for Provincials or attend as the registered team from the league.
 5. Players who attend post secondary schools and return to their home associations for Provincials must be identified on the roster by Jan. 10th.
 6. Any player who is registered with or plays with a team outside the province of Newfoundland and Labrador will not be permitted to participate in the Female Provincial Tournament.
 7. Players who refuse to try out and /or attend the Provincial Tournament with their home association will not be permitted to be picked up by another team.
 8. Goalies may be permitted to be play in a higher division in Provincials if they continue to honor their commitment to their own division and only when an age appropriate goalie cannot be found. This would require the approval of the Female Zone Coordinator.
 9. A goalie cannot play for two teams in a Provincial Tournament.
 10. Teams who refuse to travel to a designated site will be removed from the grading.
 11. To be placed on the grading, teams must have 12 players, one of whom is a goalie.
 12. The first grading report will be presented at the September meeting. The second grading will be posted on the Hockey NL web site by Jan. 15. Only teams who have their rosters filed with the office by Jan. 10th will be put on the second grading. Teams will have 7 days to request to move and the final grading will be posted Jan. 22, 2013.
 13. Requests to be moved on the grading must be made by the Female Rep of the Association and signed by their President. Female Forms are on the Hockey NL web site under Female.
 14. All teams must have a female on the bench, either as a coach, assistant coach, trainer or manager.

Female Bantam/Midget Regional Team Rules and Regulations - Player Eligibility

1. Bantam Female ages 13-14 as of Dec. 31 of the current hockey season.
2. Midget Female ages 15-17 as of Dec. 31 of the current hockey season.
3. Players must be registered and playing on Female Teams in Associations where Female Teams are available. Players must have played 50% of their regular season play to qualify for Provincial Play-downs or for the Atlantic Championship.
4. In Associations where no Female Program is offered players may register and try out in the appropriate zone.
5. Players may only try out for ONE Bantam/Midget Regional Team – either Male or Female.
6. All players must register and be in good standing with their Minor Association to attend try outs.
7. Players must attend their designated Provincial Tournament to be eligible to attend the Atlantic Championship of out of province tournaments.

Format

1. Regional Teams will be selected no later than December 15.
2. Teams must consist of 15 skaters and two goalies. If two goalies are not available in a region, the zone coordinator must be notified.
3. The try out list must be forwarded to the Zone Coordinator showing the players name, date of birth and home association.
4. Final team selection will be forwarded to the Female Zone Coordinator and to the Host Association 24 hours before players are notified.
5. Once selected the team can practice or play exhibition games providing such activities Does Not interfere or conflict with a minor hockey program.
6. Such activities should not put an undue financial burden on the players.
7. All Regional teams will compete in a Provincial Tournament to be held Jan...
8. The Provincial Tournament will be a round robin format consisting of 3-15 minute periods for Bantam and 3-20 minute periods for Midget. The top two teams advance to Championship Game. (Providing all regions participate)
9. Two hours must be allowed for all games.
10. Ice will be cleaned after every second period; this applies to the Championship Game as well.
11. There will be no Bronze medal game in Provincial Play-downs.
12. Schedules will follow the format of the Bantam Irving and Pee Wee Alliant Provincial Championship with the exception of the rest period. Female will allow a two hour rest period between games.
13. The winner of this Provincial Tournament will advance to the Atlantic Championship.
14. If a full complement of players does not try out for the regional team, every effort must be made to secure a complete roster for play-downs. **Should overtime be required in the Semi-Final Game, the format for overtime in a Championship game will be used as per Paragraph 10 G of the Provincial Tournament Procedures.**
15. The winner of the Provincial Play-down will advance to the Atlantic Championship.
16. Teams have to declare their intent to go to the Atlantic Championship prior to the Provincial Play-downs.
17. Should the Team representing Hockey NL win the Atlantic Championship they automatically advance to the Female Midget Nationals. Travel, accommodations and meals for the team and coaches will be paid for by Hockey Canada. A Branch Rep is included with the team.
18. Branches have to declare their intent to go to the Esso Female Midget Nationals (should they win the Atlantics) prior to the Provincial Play Downs. If a team withdraws after Nov.1 a \$2000 fine will be levied by Hockey Canada. Teams must be prepared to advance to both the Atlantic Championship and the Nationals of competing in the Play-downs.
19. An Association will be required to host the Provincial Tournament.

Coach Criteria

1. Head Coach or Assistant Coach must have Intermediate Level or Development 1 Certification and all coaches must have at least Coach Stream (CBET) or Coach Level.
2. All coaching staff (including trainers and managers) must have Speak Out and have completed the screening process.
3. Trainers must be HCSP certified.

Exemptions will not be given to the above criteria.

Rules

1. All regional teams must have a host association in place prior to try-outs. Host associations will be responsible for providing receipt books and receiving information concerning the team's budget and finances. The host association may make other reasonable stipulations as it sees fit. The team must obtain a letter from the President indicating that they are agreeing to act as the host association. This letter is to be forwarded to the Zone Coordinator. Teams should inform the Female Zone Coordinator of jersey colors to prevent potential conflicts.
2. The team manager can obtain the Regional Team Criteria as per Statement of Revenue and Expenditure on the Hockey NL website. This document must be sent to the host association and the Zone Coordinator.
3. Hockey NL and Hockey Canada's playing rules are to be followed for Provincial Play-Downs.
4. Upon completion of the Provincial Play-downs, the team advancing to the Atlantic Championship must confer with the Zone Coordinator before travel arrangements are made.
5. The Zone Coordinator must be copied on all correspondence concerning the Regional and Provincial teams.
6. Regional teams must assume full responsibility for any debts incurred and any damages incurred to hotel rooms. Dressing rooms. etc.
7. The Bantam Regional team will have the option to pick up a Maximum of three second year Pee Wee players, (this does not include goalies) to bring their numbers to 15 skaters. A Pee Wee player cannot displace a Bantam player.
8. The Midget Regional team will have the option to pick up a Maximum of three second year Bantam players (this does not include goalies) to bring their numbers to 15 skaters. A Bantam player cannot displace a Midget player.
9. All travel arrangements should include the Branch Rep.
10. All Regional teams should name alternates.
11. When coaches have to be informed of any change after the start of the tournament, the Hockey NL coordinator will call a meeting of all coaches concerned and if a member from the Female Committee is present, he/she is to be included or in their absence another member from the host association. Any change should be confirmed with the Hockey NL Female Chair.
12. The host association must block hotel rooms for players and coaches of all teams before any are released for parents.

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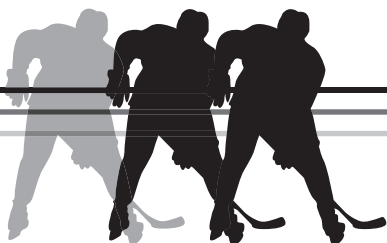
